Miss Lau: I enjoy working with nice teachers, students and parents. I like them treating me as a friend all the


time. I have a happy and joyful time teaching here.

Using recycled materials to make DIY

Do you like making DIY? Do you know that we can use recycled materials to make some fun DIY arts and crafts? We can also help to save the environment and the planet by reusing old materials. Here is a passage about how to make a monster stationary holder using just a shampoo pot. We hope you like it!



Materials:

An empty shampoo pot Black and white stickers

Paper

Scissors

Glue

Pencil

Double-sided tape

First, you need to remove the shampoo label from the pot and wash the pot thoroughly. Secondly, you need to cut a small slit in the top of the shampoo pot so you will be able to cut off the top part.

Thirdly, you need to decide what shape you would like the monster's head to be. You can cut it out with scissors. Next, draw the arms of the monster on the spare part of the shampoo pot. Then, use strong glue that is suitable for plastics to stick the arms onto the pot. You need to press hard to stick them down.

After that, draw the eyes and mouth of your monster on the paper with a pencil. Cut them out and stick them on the monster. If you have some fun stickers, you can glue them on too. To fix your stationary holder to the wall, use double-sided tape! Finally, it is finished!




Film Reviews Something for everyone!

The best place I thought was Auckland Zoo. There were many kinds of animals such as monkeys, giraffes and kiwi birds. They were amazingly cute.



Hi guys! Do you all eat margarine for breakfast? Do you know that margarine is actually not healthy? It's time for us to tell you the truth about some of these so-called "good" foods in our daily lives.

We have written our specific explanations about these two commonly consumed "healthy foods" around the world.



- 1. "SUGAR -FREE" FOODS
- 2. MARGARINE



1: Why aren't "sugar-free" foods healthy?

Are you still chewing your chewing gum made by any old manufacturer? These "sugar-free" and "tooth-friendly" gums actually contain high amounts of sugar that is very harmful for our teeth.

2: How about margarine?

Margarine, is made from plant oils that are naturally healthy on their own. However, these oils are turned into unhealthy fats during the production process. These thick fats may cause our blood to become thicker. The heart then has to work extra hard to pump blood through the body. That results in higher blood pressure levels which increase the risk of heart disease

Eating margarine is also linked to allergies in children. Margarine contains many harmful chemicals. For example, chemical food colours are used to make the margarine yellow. These chemicals are made from genetically modified crops like soy beans, and this is may be the reason for the allergic reactions.

> So, you can see, some of the food that we think is healthy is actually NOT healthy at all. Think before you buy.




Seesaw Facts

In primary 6, we are learning about seesaws. It is about how to lift an item more easily on a seesaw. If you learn this useful theory, you can use it in daily life, too. Let us introduce more about how it works!







When the distance between the force point and the fulcrum is longer than the distance between the focal point and the fulcrum, you can use less power to lift the object.

For example, in picture number 1, you will only need 20kg to lift Oliver, who is 40kg, because the distance between the arrow and the fulcrum is longer than the distance between Oliver and the fulcrum.

However, when the arrow is closer to the fulcrum (like in picture 2), you will need to use about 100kg to lift Oliver!

How does a rocket launch?

Do you know how a rocket launches?
First, it needs to defy gravity by using speed.
However, you must have sufficient power to
push the spacecraft up, as the air underneath
the rocket occupies the void. This kind of
force is called "Reaction". You might think
this term is uncommon, but "Reaction"

Such as with tennis rackets, balloons, ice-skates, guns, wheels... Even planes use this theory, too.






